



- This was made for one of the CUNY community colleges. It is 15 years old. It omits diverse perspectives. No feminist philosophy; In some places explicitly labels philosophical positions as Christian; Troglodyte view of LGBT.
- All Intro to PHIL courses should include primary texts. This one is flawed because only primary texts available free on line are made included, so coverage of standard Philosophical Introductory primary text content is unbalanced. To compensate, there are links to multiplicities of non-primary text articles on such topics. These are of quite different quality and sometimes contradict each other. Inappropriate for teaching Intro to PHIL.
- Some material conveyed by non-captioned video, so inaccessible to hearing impaired. Completely nonnavigable by screen-readers for visually impaired.
- Many links broken. Some video lectures inaudible.
